## Faith Activities for Families with Toddlers

### At This Age

Two year olds learn about the world and the people in the world through play. It is important for parents to take time to play with their children. Here are a few ideas to get you started playing. As you and your child develop your playtimes together, you will discover favorite activities.

- Have a play tea party. Pretend to really drink and eat with your child.
- Play a game of hide-and-seek. Pretend to have a hard time finding your child even though you know exactly where she is.
- Get down on your hands and knees and give horseback rides.

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# Time with Your Toddler



## God Loves Mommies based on Genesis 21:1-6

The Bible story “God Loves Mommies” was taught in Sunday school today. Read the story from here and Bible storybooks many times—toddlers like and need repetition to learn.

God loves mommies. The Bible tells us about Sarah. Sarah wanted to be a mommy. But it took a long, long time.

*(Open arms wide.)*

God promised Sarah she would be a mommy.

*(Point up.)*

God kept His promise.

God gave Sarah a baby.

The baby was Isaac.

*(Pretend to rock a baby.)*

Now Sarah was a mommy.

God loved Sarah. God loves mommies.

*(Point to heaven; then hug self.)*

These questions can be used to help your child review the Bible story.

1. Who was a mommy? (Sarah)
2. Who loves mommies? (God)
