You get sick of it.



Then I saw it: a tree. I had



always been good at climbing, so I was in the lowest branches in the shake of a lamb's tail. And I could see. There, about 50 feet away, was Jesus.

He must have seen me up there because first thing I knew He was pushing His way through the crowd to my tree. They opened up a path for Him.

He was standing 10 feet below me, looking straight up at me. What's He going to say, I asked myself. He probably knew I was a tax collector, a cheat, a fraud. If He said, "Hey, you fraud, you collaborator with the Romans," that crowd would have torn me to pieces.

Instead He said, "Come on down. Hurry up, because I'm going to stay in your home today."

He didn't need to tell me to hurry. I jumped right down in front of Him—I've always been good at jumping.

There was a low rumble that started at the tree—those who could hear what Jesus said—and spread through the crowd. "A tax collector, a sneaky little tax collector. Jesus is going to his house to spend the day." They muttered things like that.

He came home with me, and my wife put on a big feast for Him. He talked to my whole family and our servants. But especially to me.

You know what? He made me feel as tall as He was. At the same time I felt like a worm, crawling along the ground. I'd never seen myself as I really was before,

'Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. ²A man was there by the name of Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was wealthy. ³He wanted to see who Jesus was, but because he was short he could not see over the crowd. ⁴So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore-fig tree to see him, since Jesus was coming that way.

immediately. I must stay at your house today." "So he came down at once and welcomed him gladly.

⁷All the people saw this and began to mutter, "He has gone to be the guest of a sinner."

⁹Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. ¹⁰For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost."

Read Philippians 2:4. Think of someone you know from school, church, or even a family member who might be going through a rough time. Pray for that person all week long, asking God to show you how you can help.

Read Philippians 2:3-4. Draw or write a description of a person who does things for selfish reasons, and of a person who looks out for others' interests. What are the differences between your two descriptions?

What needs do you have? It's okay to take care of your needs as long as you don't become selfish. Talk to God about your needs, as well as the needs of the person you thought of on Monday.
